National Summer Learning Day to Attract Thousands to Canalside on July 12 Annual event to increase awareness about summer program to reduce "Summer Learning Loss"

Buffalo – The **Afterschool Network of Western New York (ASNWNY)** will sponsor *National Summer Learning Day* on **Wednesday, July 12 from 8:45 a.m. to 11:45 a.m.** at **Canalside Buffalo** location 44 Prime Street, Buffalo.

This 2nd annual event brings awareness to the importance of children engaging in summer programs and camps for brain stimulation when school is not in session. Additionally, funding is necessary to support and expand summer camp opportunities to cater to each student's interests.

Over 2,000 students and staff from various summer camps throughout WNY understand the significance of this message and will be in attendance. The event places an emphasis on arts, literacy, sports/health, STEM, and the need for summer meals. The event will be attended by students in the Say Yes to Education Buffalo camps and other programs throughout WNY.

Kelly Sturgis, Executive Director for the New York State Network for Youth Success, articulates the importance of these summer programs: "On average, taxpayers invest \$10-12,000 per child during the school year; then we walk away for two to three months of the summer. We essentially let 20 percent of students' academic growth be lost over the summer and fall short in supporting the 13 million children in food insecure homes."

"Events like this help to highlight the good work being done, but also reiterate the need to expand these programs so every child can have access to the benefits of a stimulating summer program to prepare them for their long-term future," said JoAnna Johnson, Co-Chair of Advocacy Committee at ASNWNY. "Engaging students in a fun, yet effective, way through these programs will allow their brains to be in consistent use, influencing the way they interact both socially and professionally."
