



**Vision:** All of New York State’s children and youth will have access to high-quality programs and services during the non-school hours that will support their success in school, college, work, and life.

**Mission:** New York State Afterschool Network (NYSAN) is a public-private partnership of statewide, regional and local groups that promote the safety, learning, and healthy development of children and youth outside the traditional classroom.

### What Does NYSAN Do?

- **Statewide Policy Agenda:** Convenes partners across the afterschool field to develop and advocate for public policies and practices that build a comprehensive and coordinated statewide afterschool system.
- **Network and Regional Communications:** Provides a website, listservs, and other communication tools to share information and resources and support its eight regional network affiliates.
- **Capacity Building:** Coordinates existing state and regional resources and develops new resources to increase access to and effectiveness of professional development and technical assistance.
- **Program Quality:** Promotes the adoption of a common system of quality standards and the development of capacity-building, assessment and evaluation tools linked to standards.

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# SUMMARY OF FUNDING STREAMS

## Federal Funding:

### 21<sup>st</sup> Century Community Learning Centers:

- Support Community Learning Centers that offer academic enrichment and youth development, particularly for youth at low-performing or high poverty schools
- \$78.1 million in FY13-14 with individual grants ranging from \$50,000-\$1,200,000
- Next RFP scheduled for 2016-17 school year

### The At-Risk Afterschool Snack and Supper Program:

- Nutrition assistance for afterschool programs, to provide free snacks and suppers to youth
- As of July 1, 2013 the program reimburses 80 cents per-snack and \$2.93 per supper
- Any program located in a school district where 50% or more of enrolled students qualify for free or reduced-price school meals are eligible to receive funding

## State Funding

### Advantage After School:

- Youth development programs with priority target of “disconnected/high-need” youth
- \$17.7 million in FY13-14

### Extended School Day/ School Violence Prevention (ESD/SVP):

- Provide support to students through extended school-day and/or school violence prevention programs.
- \$24.3 million in FY 13-14
- RFP expected in late 2013

### Youth Development Program (YDP):

- Support for providers offering positive youth development programs
- \$15.4 million for the combined YDP in FY13-14
- Most funds are distributed through local Youth Bureaus
