

Analysis Brief: Exploring How New York School District Plans Leveraged Afterschool

The New York State Network for Youth Success' newly released analysis brief, "Exploring How New York School Districts Plans to Address Learning Loss Leverage

Afterschool, Summer, and Other Expanded Learning Opportunities," provides insight for how school districts planned to spend American Rescue Plan (ARP) funding and address pandemic-related student learning loss. The brief provides an overview for how ARP funding was distributed in New York State, and breaks down the types of interventions 400 New York school districts planned to implement in 2021 to address learning loss. Our analysis found that:

- There were low levels of investment in afterschool and summer programming to address the impact of lost instructional time.
- School districts prioritized interventions that addressed academics instead of social emotional or trauma-informed interventions.
- There was limited evidence of robust partnerships between schools and communitybased organizations.
- There was limited transparency on how school districts planned to use American Rescue Plan funding.

JEDI Series Training

Gender, Identity and Colonization: an Indigenous perspective May 4, 11:00 am - 12:30 pm | Register Now

This session will examine gender and sexuality through an Indigenous lens, with a focus on the impact of colonialism on queerness and gender equity in Indigenous communities. Participants will gain a more nuanced understanding of the unique challenges faced by 2 Spirit, Queer, and Trans Indigenous people.

Unseen Tears: The Impact of Native American Residential Boarding Schools in **Western New York**

May 5, 10:00 am - 12:00 pm | Register Now

This session will take a deep look into the system of Native American residential boarding schools that were operated throughout the United States and Canada, nearly all of which followed the motto of "Kill the Indian, save the man." This system was an intentional effort to remove Native children from their communities, place them in institutions that were patterned after prison and/or military systems, and have them lose their connections with their traditional cultures and assimilate into mainstream society. Recent news reports have exposed the finding of gravesites of children who died at many of these boarding schools. This session will feature the screening and facilitated discussion of a powerful documentary. "Unseen Tears: The Impact of Native American Boarding Schools in Western New York," as well as emerging efforts designed to counteract and overcome the residual impacts of these schools.

Systems Update: Enhancing Documents & E-Forms to Better Serve LGBTQIA Youth and Families


Youth Autonomy, Empathy, and Ageism May 17, 11:00 am - 12:30 pm | Register Now

In this interactive session, participants will be invited to reflect on their own experiences and to interrogate the ageist assumptions that underpin our interactions with youth. We will seek to answer questions such as: How does fear drive us to exert more control over youth than is necessary, and how can we manage those fears? How can I safely introduce more autonomy into the expectations I set for youth, while providing the tools for them to meet those expectations successfully? How can I access empathy as a resource to build a strong foundation of trust and honesty in my relationships with youth?

Other Events

Afterschool Math Plus Curriculum Training (Thursdays 1– 2 pm)



Date and Time	Afterschool Math Plus Curriculum Topic Areas
April 18th	Jump Rope Math: Everyday Math & Exploring Jump Ropes Collect data about participants' jump rope techniques. Use the data to create bar graphs, draw conclusions, and ask questions about jumping rope.
May 16-	Jump Rope Math: The Whys of Jumping Rope Conduct surveys about why people jump rope and use data to create bar graphs and Venn diagrams to represent people's answers.
June 20»	Jump Rope Math: How Far Can You Go? Create line graphs and use data to make predictions about how far jumpers can travel in a set amount of time.
July 18∘	Jump Rope Math: Going to Great Lengths Observe patterns, create a scatter graph, and analyze data to make predictions about connections between jump rope length and jumper height.
August 15-	Jump Rope Math: Designing a Math Investigation Use bar graphs, line graphs, scatter graphs and Venn diagrams to explore different ways of answering math questions about jumping rope.
September 19-	MusicMath: Unexpected Math, Creating Rhythms, and Making Rhythm Patterns Create musical patterns, then repeat the patterns and think about how to represent the patterns using words, pictures, and symbols.
October 17»	MusicMath: Composing Music (with Math!) Experiment with repeating patterns and create new arrangements using similar sounds in different sequences.
November 14th	MusicMath: Discovering Music Fractions Identify and represent parts of fractions using music and explore combinations and permutations, or ways of creating variety while still using the same elements.
December 12th	MusicMath: Orchestration Use fractions to create musical compositions, then perform the compositions using found instruments (pans, boxes, pencils, whistles). Create new combinations and permutations for the music fractions.

Note: Each webinar will include strategies to support a positive Math Identity (e.g., role models, career connections, family connections, literacy connections).
